How will you be assessed in ERS?

The public assessment of ERS consists of public examination and School-based Assessment (SBA). The SBA is deferred to 2019. The public examination results constitute 100% of the final subject results. The following table outlines the components of the public examination:

Paper 1: Ethics	Weighting: 50%	Duration: 1 hr 45 mins
Part A : Normative Ethics (20 marks) 4-5 short questions will be set. All questions are compulsory.		
Part B : Personal and Social Issues (40 marks) There will be 4 questions, of which candidates are required to answer 2. The paper will consist of essays and guided essay questions.		
Paper 2: Religious Traditions	Weighting: 50%	Duration: 1 hr 45 mins
Candidates are to attempt one of the two modules offered, of which candidates are required to answer 3 essay-type questions.
